Clackamas, Ore. -- The Oregon Beverage Recycling Cooperative (OBRC), parent organization to [BottleDrop](#), announced a \$2,500 donation to Sunrise Enterprises, a Roseburg, Ore. based nonprofit focused on providing employment opportunities and skill building to people with developmental disabilities. The donation, generated through BottleDrop's [Containers for Change](#) program, will be used by the nonprofit to help people with disabilities access meaningful employment opportunities and achieve self-fulfilling lives.
