

## ZONE 1A CLUE EXPLANATIONS

### **Zone 1A Clue #1**

To find the treasured bottle here  
You must give it your all  
Follow the flow from all sources  
Be watched by Tsagaglala  
Hear echos of languages lost  
Down past where Wyam would fall  
There may be calmer waters now  
But once, a people stood tall.

*The Columbia River begins its journey in the southern Rocky Mountain Trench of British Columbia in Canada. It has many tributaries and over 60 dams in its watershed. Wyam, meaning "echo of falling water" or "sound of water upon the rocks," refers to Celilo Falls. The name refers to a series of cascades and waterfalls on the river, as well as to the native settlements and trading villages that existed there in various configurations for 15,000 years. Celilo was the oldest continuously inhabited community on the North American continent until 1957, when the falls and nearby settlements were submerged by the construction of The Dalles Dam. Tsagaglala, or "She Who Watches," is a large petroglyph along the Columbia River in Washington State across the river from The Dalles. The clue is designed to lead you west toward the ocean, and find calmer waters where there are no more dams. Possibly the slough, or Columbia Blvd. Narrows area within Zone 1a.*

### **Zone 1A Clue #2**

Dive into the clues and wordplay  
Like Alice spins into the hole  
Or wait and sit back to see what's revealed  
And find what the next clue may hold  
Remember to always look under  
Pretend you are out on a stroll  
Noticing others are searching?  
Then you know that you're on a roll!

*There is a hidden anagram (the first letter of each line) which leads to the city in which you will find the park in which the bottle is hidden. "Wordplay" indicates readers need to search for anagrams in the clue (there is another in Clue #4). "Spins into a hole" refers to the rabbit holes hunters go down trying to figure out hiding spots. It also refers to the golf course just North of*

*the park (which has since closed). Alice also can refer to the stern-wheel driven steamboat that operated on the Willamette and Columbia rivers in the 1870s and 1880s. Alice was the largest vessel built above Willamette Falls and was considered in its day to be the "Queen of the River." The hint to the anagram is "wordplay." The bottle is hidden under a bush, in a park with accessibilities to strollers and wheelchairs. Narrows to city.*

### **Zone 1A Clue #3**

Where food was long ago gathered  
And is gathered again once more  
Where fields of brown have turned to green  
And groves of fir are gone yet still remain  
Circles and cycles renew and renew  
Just like the bottle bill aimed to do  
The spot is hidden from a bus's view  
But you can get there by bus, too!

*The park is in a place where the indigenous people of the area gathered food, and where now there is a community garden. The indigenous people, who inhabited the shores of the river for 10,000 years or more, were virtually gone from this area by 1855. [Anthropologists call them Chinookans because they spoke a language closely related to that of the Chinook (pronounced "chin-ook," not "shin-ook") along the Oregon coast.] By that time, those who survived the plagues of smallpox, malaria and measles were sent to the Grand Ronde Reservation. The development of this former brownfield site won an Oregon Brownfields redevelopment award in 2018 and is a huge community asset for the Cully community. To reach the park, one needs to pass through the Fir Grove mobile home park. Narrows to area within the city, and park as well. (Credit to Susan Nelson for historical information)*

### **Zone 1A Clue #4**

Play match or sulk at this family park  
Where 72 crosses itself  
You can see rainbows of different kinds  
Or give yourself a workout  
Witness wildflowers at every turn  
Watch for swallows swooping  
Spiraling up to the peak  
You can view Loowit and Wy'East!

*The first four words of this clue are an anagram for "Thomas Cully Park." The access road to the park is 72nd Ave, and the #72 bus line intersects it along Columbia Blvd. In the park, there is a*

*self-directed workout route with spots for different exercises. The N, S, and E parts of the park are filled with wildflowers. One of the two sacred areas for Native Gathering Gardens has a spiral which can be viewed from above in satellite view. It is the first feature of its kind at a City of Portland park. This innovative project is based in traditional indigenous wisdom, and will create a place to: commune, cultivate indigenous foods and materials for cultural practices and traditions, & revitalize the associated knowledge, skills and ethics in an urban landscape.*

*Narrows to park.*

### **Zone 1A Clue #5**

You can learn a lot from flowers  
Especially in the month of July  
So swing or climb, or cross the bridge  
To see Much Adoe by and by.  
Your golden prize  
Spirals before your eyes  
A play area green reconnects us with the roots  
Get on out there! Grab your boots!

*“Much Adoe About Nothing” is a play being produced by The Original Practice Shakespeare Festival in July at Cully Park. The Play Area Verde is designed by children from Hacienda CDC’s Expresiones after-school program and built by Verde. Encouraging exploration, open-ended and non-directed play, and direct engagement with natural materials, as well as traditional equipment that engages youth in dynamic play including swinging, spinning, climbing and sliding. Within the play area, there are a number of accessible elements, including a wheelchair-accessible sensory wall. Verde is a non-profit group that serves communities by building environmental wealth through Social Enterprise, Outreach and Advocacy. Narrows to the area within Cully Park. Bottle hidden within a bush in the play area behind a garbage can.*

### **Zone 1A Day 5 Extra Clue!**

It’s Sunday evening and you’ve persevered fully  
You’re in the right place when you’re search is at Cully  
  
You’ve hung in there all week and the prize is near  
A water fountain, a lamppost, a garbage can and a porta-loo together mean you are here  
  
At this late hour there’s no question what your goal is  
To acquire your reward, you need not trample or break the foliage

But to be clear, a plant does conceal your prize

So look low in the green bushes and you won't believe your eyes

*After a long five days of hunting, this clue was very specifically designed to get the hunters to the bottle location. It's full of landmarks and information about how the bottle is hidden.*
